Lanark Primary is a non-denominational school of approximately 250 pupils. We have an Early Learning and Childcare service for 3-5 year olds, providing fully funded 1140 hours.

Our school rebuild was completed in November 2013 and has a varied catchment area which draws from a mix of private and council housing. The school is set in beautiful grounds with its own forest and gardens which are used to deliver outdoor education and woodland play. The school currently has four Forest School trained teachers who work alongside staff to deliver a creative outdoor curriculum throughout the school. The school has one shared play area, outdoor covered areas and each class has its own outdoor learning space. There are many extra facilities such as an outdoor stage, outdoor classroom, gardens and multi - purpose games arena.

Lanark Primary School and ELC is a non-denominational school set in the Burgh of Lanark within the rural area of Clydesdale. The school has ten classes and an ELC class. Currently we have 280 pupils from early learning to Primary. The catchment area is varied and draws from a mix of private and council housing. The school does not provide Gaelic Education.

Our new and wonderful flagship school has been built for quality learning and teaching both indoors and outdoors.







The building is single storey and set within attractive large grounds which are used to deliver outdoor education and woodland play. The design of the building embraces the outdoors and we believe in good quality teaching and learning both in the class and outside. The school has Forest School trained teachers and parents who delivers a creative Forest School curriculum, alongside valuable members of the community. A planned programme of supervised woodland play will also be delivered during break times.

Information to Proposed Transfer of School

Children and young people may transfer school for a number of reasons such as families moving house, parental choice and so on. If you are proposing a change of school for your child please provide as many contact details as possible in relation to the new school so that we can ensure a smooth transfer of information relating to your child. This will help us all to ensure the continued well being of your child.

Complaints Procedure – Making your Complaint Guide to our complaints procedure

You can make your complaint in person, by phone, by email, using our comments and complaints form or in writing. We have a two-stage complaints procedure in line with South Lanarkshire Council. We will always try to deal with your complaint quickly. But if it is clear that the matter will need a detailed investigation, we will tell you and keep you updated on our progress and follow the procedures set out below.

Stage 1: frontline resolution

We will always try to resolve your complaint quickly, within five working days if we can.

If you are dissatisfied with our response, you can ask us to consider your complaint again.

Stage 2: investigation

We will look at your complaint at this stage if you are dissatisfied with our first response. We may also look at your complaint immediately at this stage, if it is clear that it is complex or needs detailed investigation.

We will acknowledge your complaint within **three working days**. We will give you our decision as soon as possible. This will be after no more than **20 working days** unless there is clearly a good reason for needing more time.

It is important to provide feedback, in particular, when members of the public have concerns about the delivery of the service. When this happens you should have easy access to an effective procedure to allow a quick resolution to your complaint.

Care complaints- Early Learning and Childcare

We provide care services that must be registered with the Care Inspectorate. Anyone receiving care services from us has the right to complain, either directly to the Care Inspectorate, or to us. Service users may also receive care or support from other agencies under a contract with us. They may direct complaints about these services either to us (just like complaints about any council service) or directly to the Care Inspectorate.

5. Attendance

Every effort should be made to ensure that your child attends school during term time. Please contact the school as soon as possible if your child is unable to attend school. It is important for the school to work with parents/carers in encouraging children to attend school. All absences are required by law to be recorded. Absences will normally fall under two categories — authorised or unauthorised absence. In cases where your child is unable to attend school parents are asked to:

If your child is unable to attend school you are asked to let us know on the first day of absence, by calling 01555 662806 and choosing Option 1 for the Absence Line. Alternatively, you can now report an absence online via ParentsPortal.

If you know they have a hospital/dental appointment, please let us know in advance.

Requests for your child to be absent from school to make an extended visit to relatives either in the UK or overseas must be made in writing to the head teacher, detailing the reason, destination and duration of absence and arrangements for their continuing education. On these occasions the pupil will be marked as an unauthorised absence.

Parents may request that their children be permitted to be absent in order to celebrate recognised religious events. Advance notice should be provided to the school when children will be absent. Appropriate requests will be granted, and the pupil noted as an authorised absentee in the register. (See section 7).

Information on emergencies

We make every effort to ensure the school remains open during term-time for pupils. However, on occasions circumstances may arise which can affect the school. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, power failures or through any other circumstances that may impact on the school day. In such cases we shall do all we can to let you know as soon as possible. We shall keep in touch by the most appropriate method at the time normally through text message, and via our social media channels.

In cases of severe weather in the morning such as snow and a heavy frost and if there is a reason the school cannot open in the morning at the normal time, we will adopt the protocol for a delayed start until 10am.

If this is the case a message via social media and on the council's website will be posted.

The Council's website <u>www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk</u> will be used to let you know if the school is closed or has a delayed start. Further information will be provided later in the day as to whether the school will be open as normal the next day.

Things we need you to do:

a. Your commitments

We ask that you:

- support and encourage your child's learning ask them what they have been doing.
- respect and adhere to the school's policies and guidance.
- accept your responsibility to respect staff who work in the school and for the school to be proactive in taking forward its commitment to care for and educate your child.

Family holidays during term time

Every effort should be made to ensure that your child attends school during term time. Please contact the school as soon as possible if your child is unable to attend school.

Family holidays should be avoided during term time as this both disrupts the child's education and reduces learning time. If holidays are taken during times when the school is open parents should inform the school in advance by letter.

If your child is taken on a family holiday during term time, then in line with Scottish Government advice this will be classified as an unauthorised absence. However, in exceptional circumstances schools may register a family holiday during term time as an authorised absence when for example, parents are able to demonstrate they have been unable to obtain leave during the school holiday period.

Clearly, absence with no explanation from parents will mean that the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

In our approach to raising attainment and achievement it is recognised that attendance at school is something that should be continuously encouraged. Parents/carers, children and the school all have a part to play in encouraging and stressing the importance of attendance at school.

6. Parental involvement/Parent Council

7. The Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence is the name given to the curriculum in Scotland for all children and young people aged 3-18. It is forward looking, coherent, flexible and an enriched curriculum that provides young people with opportunities to engage with the knowledge, skills and attributes they will need to flourish in life, learning and work.

The curriculum places learners at the heart of education and at its centre are four fundamental capacities - successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens, and effective contributors. It includes all of the experiences that are planned for children and young people to support the development of their skills, wherever they are being educated, for example in the family and community, pre-school centre, nursery, and school.

In taking this forward our school will work closely with South Lanarkshire Education Resources and other services to enrich the curriculum, to provide the best possible education for all children and young people. We wish you to feel confident that your child is encouraged and supported to develop their literacy, numeracy and other skills whilst they attend our school. The curricular areas are as follows:

Our learning and teaching activities are based on the outcomes and experiences in the guidelines that all schools have for Curriculum for Excellence.

Level Stage

Early The pre-school years and Primary 1 or later for some.

First To the end of Primary 4, but earlier or later for some.

Second To the end of Primary 7, but earlier or later for some.

Spiritual, social, moral, and cultural values (religious observance)

Language and Literacy

We use a variety of text and strategies to teach language and literacy throughout the levels. We use Blooms Taxonomy to develop higher order reading skills and make use of resources including:

Book banded readers, novels, Talk for Writing, GL Spelling and LC Active Literacy approaches.

Reading, Writing, Listening and Talking activities are the basis of our Literacy throughout P1 – P7 and are planned for and developed within the daily classroom programme.

Reading – Pre-reading activities have started with your child long before school starts, and these continue until he/she is ready for more 'formal' reading.

The teaching of reading is based on phonological awareness. All materials and teaching develop the higher order reading skills. All children work within a group situation suited to their age and ability level.

Our school and class libraries encourage the children to read for pleasure and books may be sent home to encourage parents to participate in reading sessions with their children (reading to them, reading with them, listening to them and discussing).

Numeracy & Mathematics

Much of our work in Maths is taught using active and interactive approaches. We use a variety of teaching methods and resources for teaching maths. We place great emphasis on our children learning basic number bonds, mental calculations and tables. These are done in an interactive way and are catered for at every stage of the child's mathematical development. Children are continually assessed from the first term of P1 and their mathematics programme planned accordingly. The school mathematics policy takes the child through a wide range of practical activities in money, time, measure, shape, position and movement and problem-solving.

Information handling skills are being developed from P1 to P7.

Whenever possible, these activities are linked to real-life situations so that pupils can relate what they are learning in school to actual contexts.

Health and Wellbeing

Physical Education now comes under the area of health and wellbeing. Healthy physical development is important for all children. We promote a healthy, open attitude to life, where exercise and fun go together, encouraging a better more health-conscious life style. We provide children with a minimum of 2 hours core PE per week. However, our extensive range of activities ensures children exceed these government recommendations. This was evident in our school winning a SportsScotland Gold Award in 2018. We adopt a Better Movers Better Thinkers approach to ensure PE skills are transferable.

Swimming lessons are offered to P5 for one term each year. P6 undertake Bikeablity Training. P7 participate in a residential outdoor activity week and cross country running.





A variety of after school and early morning physical activities are normally offered in our school._We offer a varied choice of extracurricular activities over the year including Football, Badminton, Dance, Golf, Netball, Get Up and Go Club, Hula Hooping, Gardening, Reading Club, Speed Stacking Club and Choir. We participate in sport as an affiliated member of the Active Schools Programme, taking part in gymnastics, swimming and athletics events.

Our children have the opportunity to participate in a variety of musical events during the year e.g. community concerts, performing to the elderly, Sing A Song for Christmas and Lanimers. Outings to places of interest are arranged to coincide with ongoing work in classes, transport costs being subsidised by the School Fund or School Activities budget.

Our Health and Wellbeing programme is valued and is a core teaching area which incorporates healthy living, healthy eating, protective behaviours, massage, drug awareness, sex education, and personal safety, whilst being underpinned by the wellbeing indicators of Safe, Healthy, Achieving, Nurtured, Active, Respect, Responsible and Included.

The materials are interesting for children and put their message across in a way which engages the child's attention and invites discussion and questions.

Topics are dealt with in varying degrees of depth and each progressive stage, thus building up the child's knowledge and understanding of how we live and how to cope with the varying aspects of growing up in our society.

Sexual Health and Relationships

Sexual Health and Relationships Education is part of our Health Education Programme.

The topics present facts in an objective, balanced, and sensitive manner within a framework of sound values and awareness of the law on sexual behaviour. All pupils will be encouraged to appreciate the value of a stable family life, parental responsibility in bringing up children and offering them security, stability and happiness, and the value placed on marriage by religious groups or others in Scottish society.

All parents/guardians have the right to be informed about the contents of any sex education lesson and to discuss any issues with the Head Teacher or Health Education Coordinator. Parents/carers have the right to ask for their child to be removed from sex education lessons and offered alternative education.

Social Studies/Sciences

The aim of our Social Studies and Sciences programme is to give our pupils the chance to learn about, and from, our environment. In line with Curriculum for Excellence many of our topics or themes will have an integrated approach. This means that various areas of the curriculum may be covered within the one theme. Themes are developed from P1 to P7 to ensure that every class studies areas of significant local, national and international interest. Topics or themes are designed to give continuity and progression in the study of our homes, the local area, our country, and our place in the world, past, present and future.

Within our Social Studies programme, the children will learn about history, geography and people in society. In Science they will have opportunities to investigate our world and its materials thus developing both the skills and knowledge required to become responsible citizens and lifelong learners.

We aim to foster in our children an interest in current affairs, an appreciation of and care and concern for our environment. We also aim to instil in children a caring and considerate attitude towards other people of different races and cultures, tolerance of differences, responsible use of world resources and conservation issues for the future of our planet.

The themes offer ample opportunities for active learning, visits to places of interest, fieldwork and involvement with the local community.

Technologies

Lanark Primary is fortunate to have state of the art technology. Each class has a wall mounted Clever Board which operates rather like a giant iPad and allows teachers to teach interactively from it and children to use it interactively. Each class also has its own iPads or Chromebooks. ICT is used to support and enhance the learning across the school and can be used in the outdoors.



We aim to develop skills in ICT from ELC to P7 throughout all area of the curriculum making good use of digital technologies.

Parents/guardians and children in Lanark Primary will be asked, annually, to sign an internet agreement to abide by safe internet rules.

Expressive Arts

Expressive Arts covers Art and Design, Music, Dance and Drama. These areas are linked to specific topics and covered in Interdisciplinary learning. The children are afforded a great range of experiences from the curriculum and work builds on prior learning.

A variety of opportunities are available for children throughout the school to take part in music/drama activities, including Sing A Song For Christmas, Music Festivals, Lanimers, Community Events and class assemblies.

Children from P4 – P7 are given the chance to learn to play an instrument – current choices are clarinet, saxophone and flute

P5 children take part in Swimiming and have an extra session of Music for two terms of the year.

Homework



Home /school links are vital to us at Lanark Primary. All children and parents are given a copy of the Homework Policy and guidelines for information. Each child is provided with a homework /communication diary which is an important tool for sharing information between home and school.

Homework given by class teachers is a consolidation and/or extension of work taught in the class or practice in necessary skills. It is a way of building strong home/school links and allows parents the opportunity to see what their children are doing in school and to be involved in this work. This may be from any area of the curriculum, e.g. visits to the library,

questionnaires, problem-solving, sketching, preparing talks, gathering information, as well as number, words and spelling practice. As a guide, homework should take about 20 minutes for infants and 30 minutes for junior/senior pupils to complete. It should then be signed by an adult. Information is given regularly to parents to assist with homework. Sometimes there will be workshops on offer to share new resources and ideas.

8. Assessment and tracking progress

At Lanark Primary we assess children on an ongoing basis both formally and informally. Children are set learning intentions on a daily basis and use a variety of strategies to self and peer assess their learning. Each child has a



personal learning journey folder to keep a record of their achievements and attainment children in Primary 7 create a personal profile of their learning as part of transition. Teachers use dialogue, questioning, photography and filming to assess progress and carefully moderate work against the Curriculum for Excellence outcomes to provide a judgement on whether children are developing, consolidating or secure at each level.

We want to share with you on how your child's learning is progressing. We do this through the use of formal assessments each February/March to test the children in Literacy and Numeracy. These results are tracked to show progress and, as they are diagnostic, are used to plan next steps. This information helps teachers share learner progress with parents and carers. The Assessment Folders contain current assessed pieces of Writing and the formal assessments. We believe in providing children with a broad general education and hope that we use a balance of formal and informal assessment to ensure each child is attaining and achieving well and is happy whilst learning and aiming high.

9. Reporting

The school's arrangements and approaches for tracking and assessing pupils' progress include the issuing of two written reports each session- a 'Settling In' Report in September and a full report in June. We offer two parent/carer consultations each session too- one in October and one in February/March.

Our 'learner reports' will help you to get to know more about the curriculum which each child follows and will describe their strengths, achievements and areas for development so you know what encouragement and support you can give.

We welcome any comments or additional information from parents to help us provide the best possible education for your child.

10. Enrolment and Transitions

Enrolment - how to register your child for school.

To register your child for school you should complete our online registration form. This can be done using the South Lanarkshire website.

If you have any difficulty in identifying your catchment school, please email Edsuppserv.helpline@southlanarkshire.gov.uk

The online registration form will ask you to provide each child's full birth certificate and two pieces of recent official documentation both containing your permanent home address for example a utility bill, council tax statement, housing rent card, child benefit documentation.

Proof of where the child lives may also be needed.

If your child is due to start school in August 2024, you can enrol online from Monday 8 January 2024. Your catchment school will contact you between Monday 15 to Friday 19 January 2024 to confirm your enrolment.

If your child attends the nursery of your catchment school, please do not assume that they will automatically be transferred. You must register them as normal at the school that is in the catchment area for your home address

If parents want their child to go to another school, they must enrol in the first instance with their catchment school and intimate that they wish to make a placing request. An online placing request form is available from the SLC website – www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk or by contacting edsuppserv.helpline@southlanarkshire.gov.uk or phone **0303 123 1023**.

Change of School/Placing Request

Normally children attend the school in their catchment area. However, there are times when parents may wish their children to go to other schools. If you wish your child to go to another school, then you may make what is known as a 'placing request'. If you live in South Lanarkshire and decide to submit a 'placing request', we are unable to reserve a place in your catchment school until the Council have made a decision on the 'placing request'. Please note if your 'placing request' application is unsuccessful and all places at your catchment school are filled you will be offered a place at the next nearest appropriate South Lanarkshire School.

Please note that if an application for a 'placing request' is successful then school transport is not provided.

If you move outwith your catchment primary school a 'request to remain form' must be completed. If you move outwith your catchment primary, this may affect your right to transfer to the associated Secondary School. Please note the secondary school is determined by the pupil's permanent home address and chosen denomination. Transition from primary to secondary school

Pupils normally transfer from primary to secondary school between the ages of 11½ and 12½, so that they will have the opportunity to complete at least 4 years of secondary education. Arrangements are made by the school to transfer children to the associated secondary school as determined by their home address. Parents of P7 children will be informed of the transfer arrangements made for their child to attend secondary school.

We will also provide you with information at this time on events designed to support P7 children before they move on to secondary school.

11. Support for Pupils

Getting it right for every child.

Getting it right for every child (GIRFEC) supports families by making sure children and young people can receive the right help, at the right time, from the right people. The aim is to help them to grow up feeling loved, safe and respected so that they can realise their full potential.



Most children and young people get all the help and support they need from their parent(s), wider family and community but sometimes, perhaps unexpectedly, they may need a bit of extra help. GIRFEC is a way for families to work in partnership with people who can support them, such as teachers.

If you have any concerns about your child's wellbeing, you can speak to the named person who will work with you to provide support and decide how to move forward. Your school will let you know who this is. It is likely to be the Head Teacher in a primary school and a principal teacher (pupil support) in Secondary.

Support for All (Additional Support Needs)

It is school policy to assist all pupils to achieve their potential. The assessment programme, teachers' observations/discussions and parents' concerns expressed help us to identify problems and thereafter take appropriate action. Extra help will be provided according to the child's needs and the resources available. This can take any of the following forms:

- teaching materials and resources, including use of digital technologies aimed at providing the proper level of teaching and learning
- additional help from the class teacher
- support from school support staff
- help from another teacher within the school whose remit is learning support (this may vary from year to year dependent on staffing levels and the current number on the roll)
- the specialist support for learning teacher who visits the school weekly
- the speech and language therapist
- the occupational therapist and physiotherapist
- the Extended Community Pupil Support Team
- the Educational Psychological Service

At an early-stage parents and Head Teacher/DHT will discuss the provision for the child, and thereafter parents will be kept regularly informed of progress. Additional Support Plans will be put in place where needed along with parents and children and termly reviews will be set up to track progress and plan next steps. At crucial transition stages i.e. Early Years to P1 and P7 to S1 appropriate personnel will be invited along too so that relevant information is shared. Extension work is given for more able pupils and pace and challenge is there for all.

Attachment Strategy for Education Resources

Attachment – what we do to support children and young people

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources is committed to improving outcomes for children and young people by creating emotionally supportive learning experiences in our nurseries and schools.

The Education Resources Attachment Strategy supports the action in the 'Getting it Right for Every Child in South Lanarkshire's Children Services Plan 2021-23', following the launch of the Attachment Strategy in 2020, to provide staff training in Attachment and Trauma based practice.

What does it set out to do?

The aim of the strategy is to promote better experiences of attachment for South Lanarkshire's children and young people and to ensure that all education practitioners understand the importance of attachment theory and its application and how positive relationships can make a difference to outcomes.

How can I find out more?

South Lanarkshire Council Education Resources have published a series of leaflets and posters for establishments and parents/carers which aim to share information on attachment theory and on how this can inform the ways in which we support children and young people.

These are available in schools and on the SLC Learning Centre Sway accessible by teachers and staff.

12. School Improvement

Every year we publish a Standards and Quality Report which reflects our improvement journey for the session. This is made available to you on our website, or you can ask for a paper copy if you wish.

Key Successes and Achievements

Almost all learners increased their knowledge and understanding of SLC Key Skills from prior to implementation of the new framework. Teaching Staff were introduced to the new framework and as they worked together to identify skills at each stage, it became apparent that it was difficult to prioritise certain skills without having had a chance to use them first with learners. It was agreed that all classes would have access to all 'keys' and our newly developed associated 'padlocks'. Staff would record over Term 1 and 2 the skills referenced most often with learners at each stage. This information was then used to identify the most relevant Key Skills. Due to this work, we will look to support all P1-P7 learners to set targets for their learning linked to SLC Key Skills next session.

Almost all learners increased their knowledge and understanding of SLC Key Skills from prior to implementation of the new framework.

Teaching Staff were introduced to the new framework and as they worked together to identify skills at each stage, it became apparent that it was difficult to prioritise certain skills without having had a chance to use them first with learners. It was agreed that all classes would have access to all 'keys' and our newly developed associated 'padlocks'. Staff would record over Term 1 and 2 the skills referenced most often with learners at each stage. This information was then used to identify the most relevant Key Skills. Due to this work, we will look to support all P1-P7 learners to set targets for their learning linked to SLC Key Skills next session.

Almost all learners in P1 -P7 have experienced an increasingly play-based approach to Numeracy. Through this work it was highlighted that in order to develop experiences in learner-led play, we would now need to look beyond specific subject areas.

We were delighted that our work on Reading for Enjoyment led to the achievement of our Reading Schools - Gold Status Award. We received the following feedback:

"Thank you very much for submitting your evidence plan for your Reading Schools accreditation. It was amazing to read about all of your fantastic Gold-level initiatives, while seeing all of the other fantastic reading activities you have been sustaining."


Alongside the school, our ELC gained the Reading Schools- Gold Award status. This was helped by the continued focus on our Bookbug sessions with parent/carers, the ELC Lending Library, Community Book 'drop' and a focus on our 'Book of the Month'.

The ELC has implemented the 'More than Words' programme alongside Speech & Language Therapists for individuals with language and communication needs. Learners with English as an additional language have been supported through the increased use of visuals in the Playroom. Universally, language and communication development has been supported through planned play opportunities with our Play, Talk, Read partners. Feedback for parents/carers who attended the Play, Talk, Read sessions reported that they now more confident and knowledgeable about exploring play activities at home to develop their child's language and communication skills.

This session, we have continued to build upon our knowledge and understanding of Emotion Works cogs 1-5. Teaching Staff then worked together to create Grey Cog (6) that could be used across the ELC to P7 (adapted to suit each stage of development) and P1-7 were introduced to the Purple Cog (7). Almost all targeted learners increased their ability to regulate their own behaviour with the help of a trusted adult and a calm, quiet environment (Sensory Room, Woodlands, Rainbow Room, ELC Cosy Corner).

By May 2023, the new Sexual Health & Relationship programme had been introduced and implemented across P1-P7, including a parent/carer workshop to share the resource.

Improvement Planning 2023-24



Use of funding to support pupil equity

Our Pupil Equity Funding will be spent of Literacy, Numeracy and HWB Resources and Interventions and staffing to work towards the following goals for targeted learners:

Through our work in engaging with learners and their families, we reduced the number of learners with an attendance of less than 80% by 45% (11 learners to 6). This was just short of our 50% target. Targeted learners in the ELC and school have been supported across the year to enhance their ability to regulate their own behaviour, on most occasions. This has been evident through our early learners choosing 'calming' strategies or moving to the Cosy Corner when feeling overwhelmed, the increased use of our Sensory Room in the school and targeted Art, Lego and Outdoor Nurture sessions been sought out by learners themselves.

Attainment in Numeracy

• By June 2023, 25% (5 learners) of the targeted learners achieved the appropriate levels of attainment related to their age and stage in Numeracy.

Attainment in Reading

• By June 2023, 31.5% (6 learners) of the targeted learners achieved the appropriate levels of attainment related to their age and stage in Reading.

Attainment in Writing

 By June 2023, 17.4% (4 learners) of the targeted learners achieved the appropriate levels of attainment related to their age and stage in Writing.

Attainment in Listening & Talking

• By June 2023, 22.7% (5 learners) of the targeted learners achieved the appropriate levels of attainment related to their age and stage in Listening & Talking.

The above attainment data was in line with the targets set at the beginning of the session.

As well as this, 5% of our Participatory Budget (PB), a total of just over £2430, was allocated from this budget and we worked with all stakeholders to decide on how best to spend it.

Parents/carers, pupils and staff were invited to vote for their preference.

The majority votes went to 'maintaining a zero or reduced cost for class trips' and buying resources to support 'extra- curricular' activities.

13. School policies and practical information

Nursery (ELC)

All children attending a local authority nursery will be provided with a free lunch. In addition, if your child attends long mornings or afternoons e.g., over 4 hours 30 minutes they will be provided with a 'brunch' or 'afternoon tea'.

Nursery lunches and snacks are based on nutritional requirements from the NHS "Setting the Table" guidance.

Nursery age children will also receive milk and a healthy snack free of charge under the Milk and Healthy Snack scheme 2021. This will be provided by the establishment.

School

Healthy eating is something that the school supports, and a range of meals are available at lunchtime that meet the Nutritional Requirements for Food and Drink in Schools (Scotland) Regulations 2020

For their lunch each day pupils have the option to choose from two hot meal options plus a snack option. These are all served with vegetables or side salad. All meals also come with fresh chilled drinking water, salad, seasonal fruit and depending on the day - soup or a dessert.

Milk will be available for those pupils entitled to free school meals through the free school meal eligibility scheme at morning break or lunchtime.

Pupils in:

Primary 1 - 5 receive a free school lunch.

Primary 6 - 7 meal cost is £2.05.

School lunches and milk can be paid for through your Parentpay account or Paypoint facilities in local shops.

NB School Meal prices are reviewed annually and may be subject to change

Adapted diets

If your child within Nursery, Primary or Secondary requires an adapted diet for medical reasons please speak to the school/nursery office who will provide the request form for you to complete. In addition, if you have a halal or vegan diet request for your child, please speak to the school office who will provide you with a request form.

Free School Meals

Children of parents who receive the following benefits are entitled to a free lunchtime meal for their child:

Income Support, Universal Credit (where your take home pay is less than £726 per month), Job Seeker's Allowance (income based), Employment and Support Allowance (income related), Working

Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit (where your gross annual income does not exceed £8,717 as assessed by the HM Revenues and Customs), Child Tax Credit Only (where your gross annual income does not exceed £18.725 as assessed by the HM Revenues and Customs) or receive support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

If you are in receipt of Housing Benefit and/or Council Tax Reduction from us there is no need for you to apply online, we will use the information we hold to automatically award free school meals (P6 to S6) and/or school clothing grants (P1 to S6) to eligible families.

We would encourage parents of children who are in receipt of any of the above benefits to take up this opportunity of having a meal provided for their child when they are at school. Arrangements are in place so that children who receive free meals are not singled out and we encourage all children to remain in school at lunch time.

The school also offers a free Breakfast service, the service runs from 8.15am to 8.45am each school day, funded by South Lanarkshire Council. There is no need to book and children should enter via the canteen doors.

School uniform

We ask all parents/carers to support the school by encouraging your child(ren) to adhere to the agreed dress code and the wearing of our school uniform. The wearing of a school uniform helps promote the identity of the school in the local community and helps create an ethos of sharing and pride in the school.

In addition, the wearing of a uniform helps towards increasing the protection of all pupils. The wearing of a uniform helps staff and the pupils to distinguish between who belongs to the school and those who may be visitors. This enables staff to approach and identify visitors more readily and helps in trying to offer a safer environment for pupils and teachers alike.

Equality of opportunity is an important aspect of the life of the school. Any proposals on the dress code and on what constitutes the school uniform will be the subject of discussion with the Parent Council and where appropriate consultation with parents, pupils and staff.

There are forms of dress which are unacceptable in all schools such as:

- the wearing of football colours
- clothing with slogans that may cause offence (anti-religious, symbolism or political slogans)
- clothing which advertises alcohol, tobacco or drugs
- clothing which can be deemed unsuitable in terms of health and safety grounds such as shell suits, combat style clothing, dangling earrings, loose fitting clothes particularly in practical classes
- articles of clothing that could be deemed to inflict damage on other pupils or be used by others to do so
- footwear that may damage flooring.

Allergies

A significant number of children and young people in our schools will have allergies and it is important that parents keep the school fully informed on these matters.

Allergies can present in a variety of ways and can occur at any point in a person's life. Symptoms range from mild to severe. Children and young people known to have an allergy with moderate to severe symptoms will likely have a Health Care Plan drawn up by the NHS. This will detail symptoms and appropriate interventions.

It is vital that parents share this information with the school and continue to provide any updated information.

Where symptoms are mild and a Health Care Plan is not in place, parents should still continue to liaise regularly with the school on any new triggers, medications and actions required.

In all cases, our employees need to know your child's symptoms, treatments and any actions required to help prevent exposure to the allergen and minimise the risk of allergic reactions.

Employees in schools will receive training on allergies and will liaise with parents and NHS on any additional specialist training required.

In supporting children and young people with allergies, school employees will operate in accordance with South Lanarkshire Council's Safe Systems of Work / risk assessment and national guidance on the administration of medicines.

We are a **nut free** school.

Support for parent/carers

Clothing grant

In certain circumstances the Council provides support to parents/carers for the purchase of school wear. This also now includes nursery children aged 3 and 4 years old.

If you are required to submit evidence of your Tax Credit income it is important that a copy of this evidence is attached to your online application. Should you require further information, or you are unable to submit an application online then please contact the helpline number **0303 123 1011** (option 5).

Transport

South Lanarkshire Council has a policy of providing school transport to primary pupils who live more than one mile by the recognised shortest walking route from their catchment school. This policy is more generous than the law requires. This means that the provision of transport could be reviewed at any time. Parents who consider they are eligible should complete a form online www.southlanarkshire.gov.uk or contact **0303 123 1023.** These forms should be completed and returned before the end of March for those pupils starting the school in August to enable the appropriate arrangements to be made. Applications may be submitted at any time throughout the year and will be considered by Education Resources.

A privilege transport scheme is operated for mainstream school contracts where a pupil is not entitled to free school transport. Privilege transport will only be granted providing there is spare capacity on an existing school contract and will be from and to designated pick up and drop off points. Privilege transport will not be provided where a service bus is used on the school run. Any spare capacity will be allocated using agreed priorities. Pick-up points

Where school transport is provided it may be necessary for pupils to walk a certain distance to the vehicle pick-up point. Walking distance in total, including the distance from home to the pick-up point and from the drop-off point to the school in any one direction, will not exceed the authority's distance limit for school transport.

It should be noted that it is the parent's responsibility to ensure their child behaves in a safe and acceptable manner while travelling in, and alighting from, the vehicle. Misbehaviour can result in your child losing the right to school transport.

Parents are asked to note that South Lanarkshire Council does not provide transport for those pupils who attend school via a placing request.

Insurance for schools - pupils' personal effects

South Lanarkshire Council is concerned at the level of claims being received for loss or damage to pupils' clothing or personal effects. Parents are asked to note the Council's position in terms of insurance for pupils' personal effects:

Theft/loss of personal effects

The Council is not liable for the loss or theft of pupils' clothing or personal effects for example mobile phones, tablets etc. and any items are therefore brought into the school is done so at the pupil/parents' own risk.

Parents can assist by ensuring that valuable items and unnecessarily expensive items of clothing are not brought to school.

Teachers and other staff have been advised not to accept custody of any such items.

The same principle applies to musical instruments and other equipment used for activities within the school, which belong to the pupil, but are brought into the school. Parents should be aware that if such equipment is left in school, it is done at the pupil/parents' own risk.

In the case of valuable items such as musical instruments, parents should ensure that these items are covered by their own household insurance.

(ii) Damage to clothing

The Council is only liable for damage caused to pupils' clothing where the damage has resulted from the negligence of the Council or one of its employees. Claims arising otherwise will not be accepted by the Council's insurers.

Promoting Positive Behaviour

It is the responsibility of staff within the school to ensure that parent council members, parents and pupils are involved in the creation of a positive school ethos that encourages good behaviour. Equally, the school whilst trying to promote positive behaviour must support young people should incidents or bullying occur. Parents have a significant role to play in working with the school so that teachers, parents and pupils know what is expected of them in trying to change the behaviour and attitudes that contribute to bullying behaviour.

Our approach is to create an environment where better behaviour will encourage better learning. The school, along with the support of parents, can work together to create a learning environment which young people can enjoy and feel safe.

Incidents of bullying should be reported to the school immediately so that each alleged incident can be looked at. Together we can work towards creating a safer school for children and staff.

In addition, a guideline (Promoting Positive Relationships and Behaviour) has been produced to support all teaching and support staff and inform them of their roles and responsibilities in respect of dealing with the small number of children and young people who display challenging behaviour. Early identification is crucial so that intervention can be provided to support children and young people to help them address their issues and concerns. Staff training is provided to help develop the skills needed to respond to and manage challenging behaviour. A wide range of appropriate staff development opportunities has been developed for this purpose.

It is our firm belief that Better Behaviour promotes Better Learning. Our school is a place of learning which should be safe and fun to be in. Children play a part in setting the class rules and all clearly follow our Assertive Discipline Policy to encourage good behaviour at all times. Children who are consistently well behaved are rewarded and those who make wrong choices have agreed sanctions which they must abide by. At all times we encourage our children to make correct choices. If, however, a child continues to break the school rules, parents/carers will be invited in to help resolve any issues. Guidelines for our Assertive Discipline procedures are available and will be issued to all new parents and pupils.

Lanark Primary School places a strong emphasis on pupil safety and parents may wish to know that an adult presence is provided in playgrounds at break times in terms of the Schools (Safety and Supervision of Pupils) (Scotland) Regulations 1990.

Child Protection

All staff in educational establishments in South Lanarkshire Council receive an annual Child Protection update and are required to follow the advice and guidance contained within relevant Education Operating Procedures. They must also complete a mandatory Learn on Line Course "Child Protection in Education".

South Lanarkshire's children's services partnership works together to support children, young people, and their families so that children grow up in communities where they are safe, healthy, active, achieving, respected, responsible and included, and have the opportunity to achieve their full potential. They are committed to continuously improve our services to ensure children, young people and their families get the right support at the right time.

Sometimes children and young people need additional help to make sure that they are "cared for and protected from abuse and harm in a safe environment in which their rights are respected" (CPC South Lanarkshire Child Protection shared vision). The Child Protection Committee has the

overarching responsibility to ensure that agencies individually and collectively work to protect children and young people as effectively as possible.

All staff have a responsibility to report any suspicions that a child has been abused or is at risk of harm, abuse, or neglect. Robust procedures and guidance are in place to support education staff to: -

be alert to signs that a child may be experiencing risks to their wellbeing, report concerns to the head of establishment or the child protection coordinator without delay. be actively engaged in support and protection and development of wellbeing.

If you would like more information, or have a concern of a child protection nature, please contact the head of the educational establishment which your child attends.

General Data Protection Regulation as supplemented by the Data Protection Act 2018 (GDPR)

Information on pupils, parents and guardians is held by the school to enable the teaching, registration and assessment of pupils as well as associated administrative duties. The information is stored and used as per the requirements of the GDPR, with South Lanarkshire Council defined as the data controller. The Council have established a data protection policy that applies to all of its school.

Privacy Notice

Introduction

In line with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) we have produced this privacy notice to inform you how we deal with personal information as part of our statutory function as an education authority.

The Council has a legal obligation to deliver effective education services to children, young people and adult learners in South Lanarkshire. In order to do this we need to collect personal information about children, young people and their families so that we can help them to learn and keep them safe.

Using your personal information

The Council is a "controller" of the personal information you provide when enrolling for a nursery or school, applying for an education service or participating in groups or activities provided by Education Resources.

Information we collect from you about you and your child at enrolment

When you enrol for a nursery or school, we ask for the following information:

- parent/carer contact details (name, address, phone, email);
- the child's name, date of birth, gender and address;
- information about medical conditions, additional support needs, religion and ethnicity;
- any information you may wish to provide about family circumstances.

Information we collect at other times

We will also collect information at other times such as when you apply for a benefit, request a services or other support. We will provide an additional privacy notice at these times.

- If you apply for an education service or benefit, such as school transport, free school meals, clothing grant, placing request or EMA, we will also ask for personal information as set out above. We will also ask for information about your income for education benefits applications.
- If you make a request for additional support such as an educational psychologist or other support for learning we will ask for more detailed information to allow us to provide the most appropriate support for your family. This may include information about family circumstances or medical conditions.
- If there are concerns about your child's wellbeing and/or your child has needs that may require additional support, we will wish to work with you to collect and consider information to enable us to help you get the right support at the right time in line with the Getting it right for every child approach.

We require this information to ensure that children and young people are educated appropriately, supported, and that we take account of their health and wellbeing. We will also ask you to update this information annually and to tell us when there are changes to your details.

Information that we collect from other sources

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations, we receive information from other sources such as the SQA, the NHS or Social Work about you or your child, this includes:

- exam results and assessment information;
- information about health, wellbeing or child protection.

Why do we need this information?

We need this information so the Council can ensure it is delivering education services appropriately to all learners:

- for the education of children, young people and adult learners;
- for teaching, enrolment and assessment purposes and to monitor the educational progress of children, young people and adult learners;
- to keep children and young people safe and provide guidance services in school;
- to identify where additional support is needed to help children, young people and adult learners with their learning;
- to maintain records of attendance, absence and behaviour of children and young people (including exclusions);
- to support children and young people moving on each year from nursery to primary, primary to secondary and when they move or leave school;
- to help us develop and improve education services provided for young people, adult learners or families
- In accordance with our legitimate interests as an education authority we will also use your information to create statistical reports.

We will share your information with:

As an education authority and as part of our statutory function in accordance with our legal obligations we will share information with other bodies or parts of the Council, including:

- The Scottish Government and bodies such as Education Scotland, Scottish Qualifications Authority, Skills Development Scotland and other organisations that support children and young people's learning;
- Other parts of the Council when required for services such as school meals, school transport, education benefits and with Social work in connection with any child protection concerns we become aware of;
- The NHS, to support health initiatives in accordance with the legal obligation on the Council in terms of section 39(3) of the National Health Service (Scotland Act 1978;
- South Lanarkshire Leisure and Culture Limited, where children and young people are participating in sports and leisure activities;
- Other schools/local authorities if a child moves or transfers to another school the Council has an obligation to pass on information with regards to pupil records to the new school/local authority.

You have the right to access your personal information as well as the rights of rectification, erasure, restriction and the right to object.
